The Philip Goodeve-Docker Memorial Prize

Awardee:

Lorna Morgan

The Philip Goodeve-Docker Memorial Prize is offered to the top performing student of the District Nursing programme in every university in England, Wales and Northern Ireland. Philip, together with two colleagues, set out to cross the Greenland Ice Sheet in April 2013 as a challenge to raise funds for charity. Philip had chosen to fundraise for the QNI, in memory of his grandfather, Patrick Pirie-Gordon, who had been a Trustee and Treasurer of the charity for many years. The team set out on 26 April, but became trapped in a sudden and very severe polar storm. Tragically, shortly before rescue could arrive on the morning of 28 April, Philip passed away. His two colleagues were airlifted to safety, but suffered severe frostbite during their ordeal. Philip's friends and family raised funds in his memory and it is this fund that enables us to offer this prize in his name. Philip was posthumously awarded the Queen's Commendation for Bravery in January 2017 and a full Citation explaining in detail how he saved his teammates' lives was published formally in the London Gazette.

The Ellen Mary Memorial Prize

Awardee:

The QNI announced the creation of a new prize for student General Practice Nurses in 2019, named in memory of Ellen Mary, whose daughter is a Queen's Nurse, a university lecturer and an Advanced Nurse Practitioner in General Practice. The new prize is offered for outstanding students who have completed the Specialist Practice Qualification (SPQ) General Practice Nurse programme.

The Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother Award for Outstanding Service

This award is given to community nurses who provide exceptional care to their patients and demonstrate a continuing passion and enthusiasm for nursing. It is not a reward for length of service, but an acknowledgment that a nurse makes a very exceptional individual contribution to patient care and the nursing profession. Awardees:

Ben Bowers QN

'Ben is a leading clinical-academic community nurse researcher with a bright future. This is particularly impressive given he has only just completed his PhD. His clinical practice, leadership and research to date have had an enduring impact on improving person-centred care. Ben is held in high esteem as a senior community palliative care nurse in Cambridgeshire, advocating on patients' behalf and facilitating high quality care at home. He has also worked at a national level with the Queen's Nursing Institute and Department of Health and Social Care. Ben consistently demonstrates his outstanding person-centred approach and leadership in advancing care for patients and families at home.'

Karen Coles

'As a nurse working within Palliative Care, Karen has demonstrated exceptional qualities, supporting and developing nursing students, nursing services and the wider multi-disciplinary team. Her approach is always holistic, putting the patient first, looking beyond the diagnosis and ensuring her team goes the extra mile to improve patients' quality of life. With Karen's leadership the team ensure patients' needs are addressed individually and goals are reached - even when it can seem impossible. '

Patricia O'Meara

As an initial lone Palliative Care Specialist Nurse working alongside a single Palliative Care Consultant in Wales, Pat has worked tirelessly to build a progressive and sustainable service through a network across South Wales. The development of the network has been extremely beneficial in the teaching, training and supervision of members to deliver consistently high-quality care across Wales. Pat would always say that her primary driver is to make a difference to the children and families that she works with.'

Komal Patel

'Komal has made a substantial effort over a ten year period to develop both staff and service. Komal has encouraged learning that has resulted in attainment of NVQ level 3 care qualifications, and all nurses have attained a post graduate qualification in the principles of palliative care. Komal has demonstrated consistent leadership qualities by seeking ways to optimise the capabilities of the service. Her commitment to nursing care has been further exemplified when several patients in the community experienced difficulties around medicine management especially post discharge from hospital. Komal collaborated with care agencies in the community and the educational team in the hospice to devise competency training that would enable seamless medication management for a patient group who often experience rapidly changing needs.'

Katy Welsh QN

'Katy is very respected and admired by her peers, her nursing colleagues and the wider health community. Her drive, enthusiasm and compassion have grown over her 37 years of learning disability nursing. Katy is a wonderful advocate not only for nursing but also for people with a learning disability. She has a passion and drive that inspires others; she is an excellent role model. In her role as Lead Nurse within the Learning Disability Service in Devon she is a driving force in keeping the nursing team updated with the latest legislation and policies relating to learning disability nursing. She is instrumental in making sure we are represented as a profession in Senior Management meetings.'

International Community Nurse of the Year Award

This the second year that the QNI has run this Award - supported by NHS England - to recognise Internationally Educated Nurses working in community settings in England. All Internationally Educated Nurses who have worked in any health or social care setting in the community in England for 1 to 3 years were eligible for nomination by their employers. The Award winner was chosen by a panel comprised of Internationally Educated Nurses working at a senior level in England, and an independent patient representative.

Awardee:

Ananthu Ashok

'Ananthu is a very experienced internationally educated nurse. He always puts the patient and their needs at the forefront of everything he does as, in his words, 'the patient comes first'. He is passionate about everything he does, and you can observe it in his behaviour. He is courteous, kind, friendly and very accommodating, putting the needs of others first. He shows compassion to those around him and is always willing to do more than is expected of him.'

The Innovation Programme Awards

Since 1990, the QNI has funded over 300 nurse-led projects across the whole range of community nursing specialities. Dissemination of project results also helps us drive improvements in knowledge and practice. These projects could not be delivered without the funding that we received from the Burdett Trust for Nursing. Fellowship of the Institute

QNI Fellows are known leaders within their sphere of expertise; usually primary care or community based services. They often have a previous or ongoing connection with the QNI. And they are people with a high profile and the respect of their peers, who are willing to advocate on behalf of the QNI.

Howard Catton

Howard was appointed the Chief Executive Officer of the International Council of Nurses (ICN) in February 2019. Throughout his career, Howard has worked and written extensively on issues relating to the nursing and healthcare workforce and he co-chaired the first ever State of the World's Nursing Report. He has led ICN's work to respond to and support nurses globally during the pandemic and has been at the forefront of advocating for the protection of and investment in the nursing profession. Howard joined ICN in April 2016 as the Director, Nursing, Policy and Programmes. His team led the development of ICN policy and position statements, working closely with WHO and other International Organisations to provide nursing advice on global health challenges and input into formal WHO and UN decision making meetings and processes. Howard also oversaw the development of scientific programmes for ICN events including its world congresses, held every two years. In December 2019 the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland appointed Howard as Fellow of the Faculty of Nursing and Midwifery.

Rachel Hollis

Rachel Hollis is Honorary Nurse Adviser for Children's Cancer at the Leeds Children's Hospital. Before retirement in 2018 Rachel spent almost thirty years working in paediatric oncology and haematology in Leeds, most recently as Lead Nurse for Children's Cancer. She has been involved in developing services for children and young people with cancer at the local and national level. She is still a practising nurse and is active in the field of children's cancer care in a number of voluntary, advisory and professional roles. Rachel is Vice Chair of the Board of Young Lives vs Cancer, the UK's largest charity supporting the families of children with cancer. Rachel has a particular interest in international health care; she is the Vice Chair of the Board of 'World Child Cancer', a charity which works to support capacity building in

paediatric oncology in low and middle income countries. She leads a twinning partnership between the Leeds Children's Hospital and a children's cancer service in Cameroon. Rachel is a Fellow of the Royal College of Nursing and currently chairs the Professional Nursing Committee of the RCN.

Elizabeth Iro

Elizabeth Iro started in her role as Chief Nursing Officer of WHO in January 2018. Elizabeth is from the Cook Islands and has served as the country's Secretary of Health since 2012. She was the first nurse/midwife and woman to be appointed in this position. In this role, she has implemented legislative reforms to strengthen the country's health system and developed the National Health Strategic plans (2012-2016, 2017-2021) and a National Health Road Map 2017-2036, among other National policy and strategic documents. Prior to this role, she served as the country's Chief Nursing Officer from 2011 to 2012. In addition, for the first 25 years of her career, she was a practicing nurse and midwife, serving in several roles in the Cook Islands and New Zealand.

Professor Brian Webster-Henderson

Professor Brian Webster Henderson is a Professor of Nursing and Deputy Vice Chancellor (Health, Environment and Innovation) at the University of Cumbria and a recognised and established national leader in relation to nursing and health care. He is Chair of the Council of Deans of Health UK. which represents the university sector across the whole of the UK. This comprises 100 universities that provide nursing, midwifery and/or allied health profession education and research, and works at the highest level of strategic discussions on issues such as workforce, curriculum design. research and policy. He provides strategic leadership for the Institute of Health, and the Institute of Science, Natural Resources and Outdoor Studies. as well as Marketing and Recruitment, Research and Knowledge Exchange and Student Services teams across the University's campuses. Brian also leads on our equality, diversity, inclusion and well-being agendas and has a strong interest in cultural change within organisations. Brian is the Vice Chancellor Executive lead for the Lancaster and Ambleside campuses and is also an adjunct Professor at the John Hopkins University School of Nursing in Baltimore USA.

The Dora Roylance Memorial Prize

Awardee:

Grace Adegunwa-Peace

Dora Roylance completed her Queen's Nurse training in Lancashire in 1939 just as WW2 broke out. She wrote to us about her experiences of nursing during the war, of the many nights of planes passing over and dropping bombs. The nurses, tin hatted, going out to attend births even in the deep snow of 1941/42 and how the nurses got to all their patients – daily for 14 days after delivery. After the war, Dora decided to train as a Health Visitor and received a bursary to do this from the QNI. She continued to work as both a District Nurse and a Health Visitor, which she said was the best and happiest time of her life. Dora died aged 100 and left a legacy to the QNI to be used for the 'training and inspiring of nurses to excel in their work'. The Dora Roylance Prize for Student Health Visitors recognises the most outstanding Health Visitor student at each university offering the programme in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The Executive Nurse Leadership Programme (March - August 2022)

The Executive Nurse Leadership Programme is aimed at senior nurse leaders who are working at Executive or Assistant Director level in the community setting. It is funded by the National Garden Scheme and has been developed by the QNI over several years to focus on community and primary care nursing; systems leadership, strategic thinking to enhance efficiency and productivity and leading transformational change. It has a particular emphasis on leading compassionately throughout the pandemic and supporting the wellbeing of the workforce going forward.
