- As a team we're commissioned to provide IPC services covering health and social care settings, it's quite a vast area as it covers the whole of North Yorkshire
- We produce Infection Prevention and Control award-winning educational resources, policies, audit tools, face-to-face training and more.
- We can assist compliance with the Health and Social Care Act 2008: code of practice on the prevention and control of infections and related guidance (Code of Practice) and CQC registration requirements.
- Everything we do is aligned with the Social Care Act, we're wanting everyone to be on the same page and do the right thing. Everything we produce is to keep everyone compliant with CQC.
- Our multi-disciplinary team includes a Consultant Microbiologist who is an excellent resource - when there's new guidance we can ask her for her expert advice.





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2. Harrogate IPC Workbook Project, Collaborative Project with Public Health Wales

- The idea is that the healthcare worker is given the booklet (see image of booklet below) to work through and it has everything in it. It's an easy to read format and there are some questions at the end of each chapter. The manager has the correct list of answers and they go through it together.
- It takes 2 or 3 hours to complete it, although you don't have to complete it in one go. There's a certificate at the end too.
- It's a reference, so you can take it away, put it in your locker / bag and get it out when you need it, it's very informative.
- In 2010, a bespoke workbook was created for a mental health learning disability organisation, it was the first of many bespoke workbooks produced for other organisations, such as Councils and NHS organisations.
- 15 years later, over 250,000 workbooks have been produced and are in use throughout the country. They are so in demand and so useful, we are very proud of that.



Preventing Infection Workbooks

 The initial Workbook was created by Community IPC Team in 2008 for the then North Yorkshire and York and Primary Care Trust.

- We have lots of resources some are available to purchase and we do have a select few which are free to download, see www.infectionpreventioncontrol.co.uk
- The target audiences are care homes, domiciliary care, GP practices etc. We do CQC inspection packs, which includes audits and we also have free posters to download (and laminate!)
- See image below for an example of all the policies we have, it covers a whole spectrum.
- 'At the end of the day, it's all about reducing healthcare associated infections (HCAIs) and hospital admissions' = this is at the heart of all we do in IPC. It's all about doing the right thing at the right time, the smallest action such as just washing your hands before interacting with a person - omitting that can have such an impact on the wider service.

Sharon Oldfield, Registered Manager, Vida Grange Care Home Harrogate

- I've been at Vida for 10.5 years now
- Our first care home opened in 2013 and we have 3 care homes now and 500 staff.
- We've been using the handbooks since the beginning. We have our own training academy and this is a tool we couldn't do without.
- We've rolled it out to all operational staff, all administrative staff even the receptionists have to take part. Everyone needs to complete it straightaway, as soon as they start. All new starters have a 7 day classroom-based induction and they have to complete it successfully.
- If I do spot checks in IPC and something isn't right, they're given a new book and refresher training. Standards can drop which means that infection can peak which is what we want to avoid.
- We use this as a really robust tool and couldn't do without it.
- We have a high level of compliance because the booklet is informative and easy to read. We ask staff to revalidate annually too.



Gillian Partridge RN, Community Infection Prevention and Control Team Leader, Harrogate and District NHS Foundation Trust;

- We have just completed work on the 12th edition of the Care Home Workforce which is due for release this month, July 2023.
- It will be followed by a review and update of our IPC CQC inspection preparation Pack for Care Homes - we'll then start work on reviewing all GP and Domiciliary Care resources
- Our aim for the future is to produce our resources in electronic format to reduce impact on the environment. We're well underway, within few months we'll have an interactive pdf which will look like the workbooks. We've had a lot of requests for electronic versions.
- We were approached by Public Health Wales as they wanted to do a Welsh version of the booklet.
- Amanda Daniel, Lead IPC at Public Health Wales designed a pilot survey and recruited care homes around Wales and based on that wrote recommendations. 9 providers across Wales were recruited, most on the South Coast of Wales.
- There was funding for 500 copies for care home staff, with an introductory session on Teams. They were given 4 weeks to complete it and then were given an online survey. The response rate was 25% (130/500)

- They could see an improvement straight away: 90.7% thought the workbook was easy to use, 90.7% would recommend it to a colleague, 89.2% will use the workbook as evidence for CPD and 72.7% completed the workbook training in 2-3 hours.
- Some feedback examples, see image below:
- Outcome was that 8000 copies were made available to care home/ domiciliary staff by Social Care Wales, it was translated into Welsh and endorsed by the Welsh Government.
- The resources online will be launched on 1 August 2023.





Keri Llewellyn, Managing Director at All Care (S.Wales) Ltd

- We took part in the pilot and we gave it to every member of our organisation, admin included. Nothing should be taken for granted. We've required everyone to do it.
- They did it well, and eagerly, no chasing, we have a lot older staff members and they liked the fact it wasn't online. One example that stood out for me was that some of them were surprised to learn you shouldn't mix bleach with hot water.
- Since the pilot came to an end we've continued on inductions, for domiciliary care particularly, they liked being able to carry it around in their care, if they couldn't remember something . This

book has everything in one place, for us it was comprehensive. I have nothing bad to say about it and will willingly pay for it as part of our training going forward.

- It also made for good supervision sessions, we could go through the answers so it was a great training tool.
- We are hoping to have an annual update and a champion group, so we can build on that and pick out different areas and look on having a deeper dive.





3. The infection control estimate outbreak management tool: A project to improve the quality of outbreak management

Matthew Wynn BNurs, MSc, FHEA, Lecturer in Adult Nursing, School of Health and Society University of Salford

- The Infection Control Estimate (ICE) Tool was created in 2020 with the aim of guiding clinical teams through the management of outbreaks, based on a previously published concept of applying military battle planing techniques to IPC management strategies in the acute healthcare setting.
- The tool acts as a template to support the practical day to day management of outbreaks by IPC and clinical teams.
- It's a repository of information for governance purposes
- It's also a rich data set relation to the incidence of outbreaks and management strategies utilised which can be analysed locally, regionally and nationally.
- It addresses 'scatter-gun' approach by consolidating data in one place.
- It was built to be scaled nationally to facilitate rapid access to outbreak management data suitable for local, regional and national organisations





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- It's the result of collaboration between IPC professionals and built by Interneuron, a Community Interest Company that exists primary for the benefit of those in need of health and social care
- All information is consolidated in one place
- More efficient outbreak management = prompter resolution = reduced risk to patients
- Outbreaks can be costly, the ICE tool supports expedited resolution, it allows clinicians to feel empowered as they can have oversight of outbreak planning via the tool.
- Real time visualisation with intervention data overlaid to assess suitability of management approach and save costs associated with ineffective interventions
- It reduces costs associated with travel to meetings as all OM data can be accessed remotely.


- The QNI Adult Social Care Nursing Standards (SPQ) are now complete
