The Philip Goodeve-Docker Memorial Prize

Awardee:

Maria Mogford

The Philip Goodeve-Docker Memorial Prize is awarded in memory of Philip Goodeve-Docker and is offered to the top performing student of the District Nursing programme in every university in England, Wales and Northern Ireland. Philip, together with two colleagues, set out to cross the Greenland Ice Sheet in April 2013 as a challenge to raise funds for charity. Philip had chosen to fundraise for the QNI, in memory of his grandfather, Patrick Pirie-Gordon, who had been a Trustee and Treasurer of the charity for many years.

The team set out on 26 April, but became trapped in a sudden and very severe polar storm. Tragically, shortly before rescue could arrive on the morning of 28 April, Philip passed away. His two colleagues were airlifted to safety, but suffered severe frostbite during their ordeal. Philip's friends and family raised funds in his memory and it is this fund that enables us to offer this prize in his name.

Philip was posthumously awarded the Queen's Commendation for Bravery in January 2017 and a full Citation explaining in detail how he saved his teammates' lives was published formally in the London Gazette.

The Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother Award for Outstanding Service

This award is given to community nurses who provide exceptional care to their patients and demonstrate a continuing passion and enthusiasm for nursing. It is not a reward for length of service, but an acknowledgment that a nurse makes a very exceptional individual contribution to patient care and the nursing profession. Carrie McMullan, Specialist Community Public Health Nurse (School Nurse)

"Carrie is an exceptional community nurse; she began her career in the army and nursed during the Gulf war before joining the Somerset school nursing team. Part of Carrie's ethos is public health and early intervention for all and she is determined to ensure every child can reach their full protentional. Carrie is very passionate about improving health outcomes for all children and young people, using her own initiative, setting up projects in our community knowing how beneficial these can be - such as "marvellous bodies" sessions for year 2's following a survey she read which revealed children as young as year 2 were already self-conscious about their bodies and how they looked. Carrie wanted to help children to see the amazing things their bodies can do to prevent poor body image as they grow up. Carrie was part of a project setting up a converted bus into a mobile classroom to deliver sex education to the secondary schools in Somerset and conducted these sessions in an engaging and fun way for the young people. Encouraging young people to reach out to others when in need, rather than seeing it is a taboo and suffering in silence. Carrie is always so positive and is a fierce advocate for the children and families she works with. She is admired by her colleagues for the nursing she provides, every person is lucky to have met with Carrie as her passion for the role is infectious."

"Pam is a true inspiration to her immediate team and is held in high regard both across the NHS organisations she works with and externally. She consistently displays her commitment to innovation and applies evidenced based knowledge in order to improve practice. She is a leader who is passionate about delivering high quality care for the individuals and communities that she serves. Pam is an enthusiastic advocate for quality and accessible health and wellbeing at work. She manages the contracts for the Employee Assistance Programme (EAP) and Occupational Musculoskeletal Support Service which, with the NWL OH SS, constitutes the support structure for staff in the host organisation. Ensuring that services are regularly highlighted through communications and support groups; for easy access and utilisation by staff at all levels of the Trust. Her innovation has seen the piloting of an MSK digital triage tool being adapted in the Occupational Health setting for NHS staff. Due to the success of this programme, the concept has now been adapted across other OH services

Pam displays an unmatched dedication, passion and pride for OH. Her ability to remain calm in the face of adversity and provide reassurance to her immediate team and stakeholders, means that her leadership is well trusted and much respected. She has a track record of empowering and nurturing colleagues to be their best. International Community Nurse of the Year Award

QNI Fellows are known leaders within their sphere of expertise; usually primary care or community based services. They often have a previous or ongoing connection with the QNI. And they are people with a high profile and the respect of their peers, who are willing to advocate on behalf of the QNI.

Karen Bonner MBE, Chief Nurse & Director for Infection Prevention & Control, Buckinghamshire Healthcare NHS Trust

Karen is a graduate of the NHS Leadership Academy's senior leaders and Nye Bevan programs, as well as the Leadership College for Government's deputy CEO accelerated program. Karen served on the NHS Workforce Race Equality Standard advisory group (2017-2021) and was highly commended by Nursing Times for her work in diversity and inclusion in 2019. Recognized by Health Service Journal in 2021-2023 as one of the most influential Black, Asian, and minority ethnic people in health, she was also celebrated by Nursing Times among 75 nurses who have shaped the NHS. In 2024, Karen received her MBE in recognition of her contribution to nursing, as part of the King's Birthday Honours.

Dr Ben Bowers QN, Wellcome Post-Doctoral Fellow, University of Cambridge & Honorary Nurse Consultant in Palliative Care

Ben is a clinical academic community nurse with 19 years of experience specializing in palliative and end-of-life care. A Queen's Nurse since 2009, Ben is dedicated to advancing person-centered care through community nursing research. He co-founded and leads the UK-wide Community Nursing Research Forum, collaborating closely with the QNI to build a supportive community for nursing research.

Recognized among the 75 nurses who have significantly impacted the NHS, Ben received the Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother Award in 2022 and the European Association for Palliative Care Early Researcher Award in 2023. His current research at Cambridge focuses on improving end-of-life symptom management for adults at home, supported by a Wellcome Fellowship to explore safe, timely use of injectable medications.

Michelle Cox, Race Equality Consultant, Michelle Cox Consultancy

Michelle has over 30 years experience of working in the NHS. She has a clinical background in community nursing and is passionate about anti-racism practices. Michelle is a Queen's Nurse and is a Fellow of the Royal College of Nursing.

Michelle won a landmark Employment Tribunal in February 2023, taking on her employer for race discrimination, harassment, victimisation and detriments for whistleblowing: a win for all global majority staff in the NHS experiencing discrimination. Michelle has a particular interest in health inequalities. As a black nurse she has shone a light on issues affecting not just black communities and ethnic minorities, in her hometown of Liverpool, but has led on a number of national programs to elevate understandings around equality, diversity and inclusion, ensuring that challenges are addressed and learning embedded throughout NHS organisations. In 2024, Michelle received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the National BAME Health and Care Awards.

Steve Forsyth, Chief Nurse, Rotherham Doncaster and South Humber NHS Foundation Trust.

Over the last two decades, Steve has worked in criminal justice, physical health and mental health services. A registered nurse in both adult nursing and mental health, Steve is a qualified best interest assessor and is trained to carry out eye movement desensitisation and reprocessing (EMDR). Steve's nursing career began in 1997 with his nurse training and a role as a care assistant. He was inspired by his mother, Inderjit, who came to the UK from India in October 1959, qualified as a nurse in 1975 and is still practising almost 50 years later.

Steve is a member of the national global majority chief nurse officer group, an active and proud member of the Jabali network, the Nola Ishmael executive nurses group, Asian professionals national alliance (APNA) and British Indian nurses association (BINA), the Gambian force and a director for the African Caribbean community initiative.

Professor Pam Cipriano PhD, President of International Council of Nurses and Co-Chair of UHC 2030 for the United Nations

Dr. Pamela Cipriano, President of the International Council of Nurses (ICN) and Professor at the University of Virginia, is a dedicated advocate for nursing and resilient health systems. She has played a key role in global healthcare policy, promoting accessible, quality care. Previously, she served as Dean of UVA's School of Nursing, ICN's First Vice President, and President of the American Nurses Association from 2014 to 2018. With over 40 years in nursing, Dr Cipriano's career spans significant leadership roles, including Chief Clinical Officer at UVA Health, where she guided the system to its first Magnet designation. She champions safe, supportive work environments and clinician well-being, working with the National Academy of Medicine to reduce regulatory burdens. Recognized widely for her leadership, Dr Cipriano has been honoured as a Distinguished Nurse Scholar-in-Residence at the Institute of Medicine, a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, and among Modern Healthcare's "Top 100 Most Influential People in Healthcare" (2015-2018). She was also the founding editor of American Nurse Today.

Fiona Nolan, Clinical Professor & Director of Nursing at Camden and Islington NHS Foundation Trust & Barnet Enfield and Haringey Mental Health Trust

Fiona is an experienced mental health nurse and researcher who has collaborated with colleagues worldwide, including in China, Mongolia, Sri Lanka, and Zimbabwe. Originally from Ireland, she moved to the UK to train as a nurse, qualifying at 21, and later earned a degree in Politics and Economics and a PhD in Social and Community Psychiatry from University College London.

With extensive experience in acute inpatient and community mental health care, Fiona began her research career in 1999 and has since managed crisis teams and led evaluations of new mental health services. She currently leads a study on body-worn cameras in mental health inpatient wards through the Digital Health Innovation Hub.

Fiona also chairs the Zimbabwe Life Project, which supports mental health professionals in Zimbabwe. A former Clinical Chair in Nursing and past Chair of Mental Health Nurse Academics UK, she is committed to advancing mental health research and nursing education globally.

The Dora Roylance Memorial Prize

Awardee:

Sapana Ranabhat Basnet

Dora Roylance completed her Queen's Nurse training in Lancashire in 1939 just as WW2 broke out. She wrote to us about her experiences of nursing during the war, of the many nights of planes passing over and dropping bombs. The nurses, tin hatted, going out to attend births even in the deep snow of 1941/42 and how the nurses got to all their patients – daily for 14 days after delivery. After the war, Dora decided to train as a Health Visitor and received a bursary to do this from the QNI. She continued to work as both a District Nurse and a Health Visitor, which she said was the best and happiest time of her life. Dora died aged 100 and left a legacy to the QNI to be used for the 'training and inspiring of nurses to excel in their work'. The Dora Roylance Prize for Student Health Visitors recognises the most outstanding Health Visitor student at each university offering the programme in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The Ellen Mary Memorial Prize

Awardee:

Michelle Hearney (online)

The QNI announced the creation of a prize for student General Practice Nurses in 2019, named in memory of Ellen Mary, whose daughter is a Queen's Nurse, a university lecturer and an Advanced Nurse Practitioner in General Practice. As a young woman Ellen Mary joined the St John Ambulance Service to learn first aid and home nursing. After WW2 Ellen volunteered as a Special Constable and during 21 years of service, became the first female Sergeant in her area. She was also well-known as a Parish Councillor and the President of the Women's Institute for many years. The prize is offered for outstanding students who have completed the Specialist Practice Qualification (SPQ) General Practice Nurse programme.

The Dame Elizabeth Fradd Memorial Prize

Awardee:

Lorraine Sonders (online)

The Dame Elizabeth Fradd Memorial Prize for Outstanding Achievement as a Community Children's Nurse Student was established in 2024. Professor Dame Elizabeth Fradd DBE, a Fellow of the QNI and a distinguished children's nurse, held various roles as a registered nurse, midwife, and health visitor. She later became Deputy Chief Nursing Officer for England and Director of Nursing at the Commission for Health Improvement. In 2009, she was awarded the DBE for her contributions to nursing and healthcare. A Fellow of multiple esteemed institutions, including the Royal College of Nursing and the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health, Dame Elizabeth's legacy is honoured by this annual prize for the most outstanding student in the Specialist Practice Qualification in Community Children's Nursing across universities in England, Wales, and Northern Ireland.
